Temporary Road Closure on the 2200 block of 15th Street, and 16th Street, NE, the 1500 Block of Admas Street, NE and from the 1300-1600 Blocks of W Street, NE For DC PLUG Feeder 14008 from July 15 to July 23, 2024.

(WASHINGTON, DC) – The District Department of Transportation (DDOT) advises of the temporary road closure on the **2200 block of 15th and 16th Street, NE, the 1500 block of Admas Street, NE, and the 1300-1600 blocks of W Street, NE**, for milling and paving restoration.

2200 block of 15th Street between Downing Street, NE, and Adams Street, NE

2200 block of 16th Street between Admas and W Street, NE

1500 block of Adams Street between 15th and 16th Street, NE

1300-1600 blocks of W Street between Montana Avenue and Downing Street, NE

The temporary road closure will begin from July 15 to July 23, 2024, between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., weather permitting. Residents will still have access to their homes, and parking will be prohibited as marked by “Emergency No Parking” signs.

The road closure is necessary to complete the DC Power Line Undergrounding (DC PLUG) initiatives for Feeder 14008 for the Asphalt base restoration. The DC PLUG initiative is a partnership between the DDOT and Pepco to improve the resiliency and reliability of the District of Columbia electric system by placing select systems underground. Feeders are primary distribution power lines that provide services to approximately 1,100 residents within a specific neighborhood.
